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LSA 2022 Lisbon Recap

Dear Friends,

Thank you to those of you who participated in the Global Meeting of the Law and Society Association with us in Lisbon and online. This year we worked with the European Sex Workers Rights Alliance (ESWA), Movimento dxs Trabalhadorxs do Sexo (MTS), and Group of Activists on Treatment (GAT). During the week in-person sessions were well attended with between 22-35 attendees at each session. On Friday we held a fundraiser for MTS that resulted in a total of \$820 (\$375 in cash, \$445 in online donations). MTS plans to use these funds to apply to officialize their organization in Portugal. We wish to express our gratitude to Luca Stevenson (ESWA) and Sergio of MTS for their pivotal role in organizing these events with us.

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CFP: Announcement of Special Issue

"Occupational Health of Female Sex and Entertainment Workers"

A special issue of International Journal of Environmental Research and Public Health (ISSN 1660-4601).

This special issue belongs to the section "Occupational Safety and Health".

Dear Colleagues,

The venues where sex and entertainment workers work and live can play a critical factor in impacting their sexual and reproductive health outcomes. Entertainment venues often provide a mix of risk and protective factors. Due to the range of formality of the workplace, the stigmatizing nature of the job, and the potentially illegal status of the work, the occupational health of women sex and entertainment workers has not been well studied. Women sex and entertainment workers are considered a vulnerable population because they are at higher risk of sexual and mental ill health as well as experiencing gender-based violence (GBV). These increased risks have been linked to social stigma and discrimination, criminalization of prostitution, and limited access to health and other essential services. Entertainment venues have the potential to be places where health and safety standards are promoted and enforced. They may also be places where collective organizing, empowerment, and advocacy can occur. Exemplar efforts to improve the health and safety of sex and entertainment workers typically address the structural conditions that lead to power imbalances and undermine agency. Venues that promote these types of interventions can be held up as examples of best policies and practices for their promotion of 'enabling environments' for preventing HIV, other sexually transmitted infections (STIs), GBV and promoting access to health services. We invite scholars and practitioners to submit original research, program evaluations, case studies and policy analysis manuscripts to this special issue.
