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**LSA Global Meeting 2022 – Lisbon CRN6**

**Theme: Rage, Reckoning, & Remedy**

**Conference Dates: July 13-16, 2022 | Registration Now Open**

Dear CRN6 Members,

Despite the challenges posed by the pandemic, CRN6 has received submissions for 24 paper presentations and a roundtable panel and thus anticipates 5 full in-person panels at the 2022 Annual Meeting of the Law and Society Association in Lisbon and one full virtual panel. We would like to strongly urge those of you able to attend the conference to come and support and learn from your peers who will be presenting in Lisbon (or virtually) at the annual meeting from July 13-16, 2022.

Until February 15th, registration rates for in-person attendance at LSA 2022 range from \$200-\$350 for non-students, depending on one's country of residence, and are \$150 for students. The rates for attending the virtual conference are \$65 for students, \$160 for non-students, and \$90 for LSA special international registrants.

We realize that with the current state of Omicron and the pandemic, this is a less than ideal time to write asking CRN6 members about conference registration for next summer. We initially had several concerns about early registration and so we reached out to LSA's Organizing committee to seek information regarding contingencies for registration given the unpredictable state of the global coronavirus pandemic. We have learned the following:

- For those who register and then change their plans, LSA will offer a 50% refund on registration for members who choose not to attend or participate, no questions asked, up until June 1st, 2022.
- June 1st is also the deadline to change between in-person and virtual registration. Those who register for the virtual conference can pay the difference to attend in person up until this date, because in-person participation costs more than virtual registration.
- As of now, LSA does not plan to offer a refund of the difference between onsite versus virtual conference presentation for those who register to attend in-person and want to switch to a virtual-only registration.
- LSA has indicated that given the fluidity of the situation, these policies are subject to change.

We look forward to seeing many of you in Lisbon this summer and thank you for your continued support and awesomeness!
