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2024 CRN6 Day of Dialogue Report

On June 5th, CRN 6 members and organizers affiliated with the Rouge Support Network (RSN) convened for the Day of Dialogue (DOD), our latations, which were inspired by real life experiences, asked us to consider how we would respond when confronted with barriers and dehumanizing treatment from the criminal legal system, hospitals and healthcare, housing providers, and banks. The exercise invoked visceral responses for many of us and was both illuminating and memorable. CRN 6 and RSN organizers will be working together to transform it into a classroom activity that instructors can bring into their classrooms when teaching about the social and legal obstacles sex workers confront in their everyday lives due to stigma and criminalization. RSN organizers will retain the copyrights for all educational materials produced. [RS2] We concluded the DOD with a group discussion where we decompressed from the event and discussed plans for future and on-going collaborations. After the DOD, RSN shifted gears and organized a community event to celebrate International Whores Day. Though none of us could attend, we heard it was a great party.

We look forward to continuing our collaborations with the RSN and building our DOD network when we reconvene in Chicago for the LSA in 2025.

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Call for Papers: Exploring Media Representations of Human Trafficking

Editor: Menaka Raguparan, PhD; University of North Carolina Wilmington

I invite scholars, activists, and practitioners to contribute to a groundbreaking volume on Human Trafficking in Mass Media: (Mis)Representations, Sensationalization, and Implications, currently under consideration with Palgrave Publishing for their esteemed Crime and Media series.

Human trafficking, a hot-button public debate and policy issue, is frequently sensationalized and misrepresented in mass media. Media coverage often distorts realities and influences public perception. This edited collection seeks to critically examine the multifaceted role of media in shaping narratives surrounding human trafficking, locally and internationally.

Drawing on the framework outlined by Austin and Farrell (2017)^[1], which identifies three primary framing strategies employed by the media—Diagnostic, Prognostic, and Motivational—this volume aims to dissect and analyze how these frames contribute to the construction and perpetuation of specific narratives surrounding human trafficking.

I invite contributions that explore a wide range of topics, including but not limited to:

Analyzing media representations of human trafficking and their impact on public perception and policy formulation.

Examining the intersectionality of race, gender, and class in media depictions of human trafficking victims and perpetrators.

Investigating the role of digital media and social networking platforms in disseminating information and shaping narratives about human trafficking.

Exploring the ethical implications of media coverage of human trafficking, including issues of sensationalism, victimization, and survivor empowerment.

Examining the influence of popular culture, including films, television shows, and literature, on shaping public attitudes and understanding of human trafficking.

I welcome interdisciplinary and decolonial approaches and encourage submissions from scholars across fields such as media studies, sociology, criminology, gender studies, anthropology, law, and beyond.

Additionally, I seek contributions that offer empirical research, theoretical insights, case studies, activist perspectives, and policy analyses. (Continues on next page)
